Message from the Founder Chairperson

One more year, one more chance, and I am happy to report that LILY supporters grasped the opportunity to widen and deepen the scope of our anti-trafficking activities. Over 100,000 lives have been impacted, including victims, their families, and entire communities

I am always shocked by how little it costs to buy a human being: a handbag costs more to buy. I am also astounded by how easy it is to ignore the whole issue. It seems possible to be shocked and bored at the same time: many come to me to express horror at the plight of the tragic children, then they turn away and forget. I want to thank those who did not forget. Instead, they gave generously and helped us to spread a blanket of care and concern over the abused and exploited children. For girls like 4-year old Lily there were no dolls, only imprisonment and rape by adult males. There are millions of Lilys out there - an estimate puts the number at 3 million. One girl to you may seem like a dot in the millions, but to that girl Lily it is her whole life. We are fighting for the basic human rights of these children and 'we refuse to believe that the bank of justice is bankrupt', as Martin Luther King said.

My committee and I work voluntarily and I wish to thank them all for their consistent support. I thank Ms Bina Rani, Mr Kauser Kazmi, Ms Heena Vekaria, Ms Shama Bhardwaj, Mr Vijay Goel and Mr Manoj Ladwa. LILY IMPACT 2016-2017



13,834

LILY supported the education of 13,834 girls across India. Without education, many of these girls would have been sold, trafficked, engaged in child labour or domestic servitude.

251



Last year, LILY supported the skills training of 251 young women and girls rescued from trafficking. Most of these women are now employed and some of them run their own businesses.

LILY also supported community health care initiatives by providing health camps in poverty stricken slums where most people cannot afford basic health care. Through LILY's support 2480 people have received health care services.

As part of LILY's advocacy programme, young women and girls from local communities were trained and enrolled as members of vigilante groups to prevent children from being trafficked. Last year, 42,930 people were enrolled.

LILY'S STORY

A 4-year old girl was sold into slavery for about £50. Our team rescued her from a Delhi brothel and took her to a safe home. Lily, after whom our campaign is named, was raised in the sheltered home and is now 22. Her story illustrates the best and worst of what could happen. She was raped and badly traumatised, and needed medical treatment and mental counselling. But she was carefully nurtured in a safe environment where she completed her education. She sings well too. Her ambition is 'to teach mothers to love their children.' Her own mother, a prostitute and drug addict, did not love her, otherwise she would not have sold her.


Empowering survivors through livelihoods opportunities

LILY Against Human Trafficking empowers survivors through skills training such as tailoring, beauty culture and social entrepreneurship to enable young women and girls live with dignity.

LILY supported organisations in India and Nepal to help trafficking victims from extremely poor families to find alternative livelihoods.

The livelihoods training programmes also help in preventing second-generation prostitution of children of sex workers. This breaks the vicious cycle for children born in brothels who face a higher risk of being forced into prostitution.

Shabana's story is one such success story. LILY provides opportunities to girls like Shabana, living in East Delhi's Bawana slum colony to become economically independent. LILY's work in prevention has saved hundreds of girls like Shabana from getting trafficked. Today Shabana is a confident girl who caters to the high demand for hair dressers and make-up artists for weddings and festivals.

SHABANA'S STORY

Shabana, 23, lives in Bawana slum colony in East Delhi. Her family migrated to Delhi 10 years ago from Uttar Pradesh. Her father runs a small tea stall and her three brothers work as daily wage labourers. She is trained as a beautician through LILY's livelihoods project.

Today she runs the parlour in her humble home earning close to £24 per month on an average. Shabana contributes her income to help her family run the household.

LIVELIHOODS



“I really want to work in a reputed salon to gain some experience, but my family feels the distance is too far for me to commute daily. I am trying to save as much as I can so that I can open my parlour someday. Right now, this is all I can afford but I am happy, I have clients coming for weddings and other festive occasions. I wait for festivals, this is the time I get to earn some extra income to buy beauty supplies.” - Shabana

NEPAL

Through LILY's support, **six class rooms** have been constructed in the earthquake devastated district of Sindhupal chowk in Nepal. The project has provided education to **183 girls and 173 boys** at Rithane School. Besides school education, children were also encouraged to participate in community sports events and workshops to spread awareness about the dangers of child trafficking. A school club themed, **My School My Voice (MSMV)** was also formed where school children have become members and actively participate in events organised by the club.

UTTAR PRADESH

10 Village Level Child Protection Committee, 5 Anti-Child Trafficking Groups and 10 Child Parliaments were formed through LILY's support to strengthen networks that prevent child trafficking across the Indo-Nepal border. The project was implemented in **10 villages in Bariach, Uttar Pradesh** near the Indo-Nepal border. Through this initiative, more than **2000 Indian and Nepali children** have participated in the Child Parliament events to generate awareness about child rights, value of education and the prevention of child marriages.



RAJASTHAN

74 girls received full scholarships to pursue their education through LILY's support. All 74 girls belong to families living below the poverty line with an income of less than **£43** per month. Most of the girls are from Nat, Bedia and Kanjar tribes where traditionally girls are forced into prostitution to supplement the family income. Without education and skill training, girls have no other options. LILY's project is helping to break this cycle by giving them an opportunity to study and pursue other work.

ASSAM

In this period, **64 school girls and 7 undergraduate girls** received support from LILY to pursue their education. Many of the girls were trafficked during the communal violence in Assam. Some of the girls were sent to Bhutan as domestic help and others to Indian metro cities where they faced physical and sexual abuse. They now reside in a home supported by LILY in a safe and protected environment.



Enabling girls to realise their dreams through education

EDUCATION



MUMBAI

2000 children in three red-light districts of Mumbai have received education through LILY's support. Children living in the red light areas are deprived of their basic rights. They come from remote, poverty stricken villages and are thrown into the cities that are a foreign world. The project also provides psychosocial counselling to children placed in shelter facilities for long-term care and protection.

BIHAR

In Kishanganj, Bihar, **255 children** have been put into school after being rescued from child labour, child marriage and trafficking by organised criminal gangs. Bihar records show that a large number of children going missing from the state each year. Most of the children trafficked are lured to the cities with false promises. Internal child trafficking has risen in Bihar due to extreme poverty and lack of awareness. LILY supports the transition home for rescued children.



DELHI

LILY supported 56 children through a non-formal education centre in Delhi. The centre provides supplementary education to first generation learners. Well-balanced nutritious meals are also given to all the children who come to the centre. In addition, stationery and toiletries are also given to the children as part of health and hygiene programmes. LILY also supported 10 girls to pursue education through Open University.

JAIPUR

73 children are now going to school daily through LILY's support. A jeep was purchased to pick up and drop children daily from their homes in the villages and take them to school. Many children tend to drop out of schools because of the distance and unsafe routes. In a state like Rajasthan where the birth of a boy is preferred over that of a girl, girls are often prevented from attending schools. The project ensures that all children, especially girls, get the opportunity to be educated.

LILY Against Human Trafficking supported organisations in India and Nepal to rescue and rehabilitate young women and girls who were trafficked. Most of the trafficking victims are tricked by middlemen with false promises of a better life in metro cities. Some of the victims were trafficked across the Indo-Nepal borders for sexual slavery.

Extreme poverty, ignorance and the desperation of poor families to give a better future to their daughters is cruelly exploited by traffickers. These traffickers are often maternal and paternal uncles.

LILY's partner organisations work closely with local police and armed border forces such as the Sashastra Seema Bal (SSB) to keep a close eye on young women and girls who cross the Indo Nepal borders daily.

Internal trafficking within the country is also on the rise. Every day at least 22 children go missing in Delhi alone.

A Thousand Dreams

PRATIMA'S STORY

Pratima was rescued in 2009 from GB Road, Delhi's notorious red-light district. Her poor parents could not take care of all six children so they sent her to Delhi from Nepal on the false promise of a job as domestic help. At 13, she was sold to a brothel. Pratima is lucky to have been rescued.

With LILY's support, Pratima has received training in tailoring and bead work. Initially she was not keen to pursue education but she is now enrolled in grade 8 in National Open School in Delhi.

Pratima currently lives in Aashray home with other survivors like herself. She has gained confidence and takes pride in her work at The Thousand Dreams, a social enterprise set up by trafficking survivors.



RESCUE & REHABILITATION

“I am not ashamed of what had happened to me, I just feel very lucky that life has turned out to be good for me. I am no longer angry and I have erased what has happened from my memory. I have many sisters at Aashray who love me and accept me the way I am. I love stitching fashionable clothes for our international clients who send us orders for boutiques in Europe and other countries.” Pratima

LILY Against Human Trafficking equips and empowers women community leaders across India to form vigilante groups to fight against child trafficking. With the support of local police, magistrate and armed border forces, women vigilante group members are trained to create awareness about the harms and dangers of child trafficking in their localities.

Training sessions and workshops on Gender sensitisation are held regularly amongst various stakeholders to ensure that parents of young children are well informed and understand the dangers of sending away their daughters for better opportunities in the metro cities.

LILY also supports organisations that are actively involved in rescue, rehabilitation and repatriation so that every rescued child receives proper care and guidance when they are reunited with their parents.

Our registered UK charity partner is iPartner India (Charity no: 1114944). Bina Rani, Founder and CEO of iPartner India, is an integral part of the LILY team, providing invaluable advice and support based on her wide experience.

iPartner India is a not-for-profit that works to make a difference in the complex challenges in social justice and equity facing modern India. They enable courageous grassroots organisations to grow to the next level, leading by innovative and sustainable solutions.

Since their inception in 2009, iPartner India has raised and advised on philanthropic activities to the value of £7 million. They have funded over 75 projects across 17 Indian states, and their work has impacted over half a million vulnerable children, men & women. iPartner India provides regular updates, statements of account and yearly audit reports to LILY.

EVERY8MINUTES

ANTI-CHILD TRAFFICKING CAMPAIGN

The Every8Minutes campaign was launched by iPartner India in November 2014 to STOP modern day slavery.

iPartner India has supported NGOs working on the frontline of anti-trafficking efforts in India and helped thousands of child trafficking victims in 11 states in India. iPartner India believes that the fight against child trafficking needs bold initiatives, participation of local communities, and tangible solutions.

The campaign provides a platform to reach out to local communities to spread awareness about child trafficking and how hundreds of girls and young women go missing every day in India.




WOMEN IN BUSINESS

LILY has supported more than 900 rescued women and girls to start their own businesses. LILY has supported projects in India and Nepal that enable victims of trafficking to rebuild their lives by becoming economically independent. Poverty and illiteracy are some of the main reasons why so many young women and girls fall prey to trafficking.

In Rajasthan, LILY supports a project where women are trained as artisans in traditional block printing work and tailoring. After the training, women join the enterprise as artisans. They are paid according to the work they undertake and can earn up to £60 per month.

Sabha, 38, is from Aderkot village in Rajasthan where many women work as prostitutes in secret. Sabha has five children and her husband owns a teashop and earns very little, making it very difficult for the family to sustain themselves. She also runs a small grocery shop from her home to supplement the family income. LILY's livelihoods project has helped Sabha to get trained as an artisan in traditional block printing. Sabha now has an additional income to pay for her children's meals and education.

LILY FOUNDATION INDIA

LILY Foundation India is a registered Trust in India. Ms Rita Bhagwati is the Managing Trustee. Lady Mohini Kent Noon and Ms Shoba Mathai are Trustees.

Last year, LILY Foundation received a grant from Saksoft Limited, a global leader in providing digital transformation solutions.

The grant was used by The LILY Foundation to support one organisation in Jaipur and two organisations in Delhi. In Jaipur, the grant helped purchase a Jeep, which now ferries children from poor villages in the suburbs to school.

In Delhi, the grant has enabled two former sex workers to start their own catering business. The grant also provided 10 computers to two slum colonies in Tughlakabad and Bawana to ensure that slum children have access to computer training.

MANJU'S STORY

Manju, 46, is a successful businesswoman. She lives with her husband and four grown-up children near Bharatpur. Manju was fortunate to study in a school supported by LILY. She has now become a teacher at the local government school. She earns extra by giving private tuitions. Her four children have all been educated in the same school, and two of them are married. Manju is a grandmother.


Life could have so different for Manju. Her mother, Indramani, was a prostitute and Manju seemed destined to follow her into the trade. The family come from an area near Bharatpur where pubescent girls are routinely forced into prostitution by their own fathers and brothers. Indramani was sent to a brothel in Bihar and endured a life of abuse and assault by the brothel clients who were largely truck-drivers, daily wage labourers and even policemen. In the brothel, she gave birth to three daughters and two sons. Manju spent the first 13 years of her life in the brothel, but her mother was determined to give her children a different life. She married off her eldest daughter and sent Manju and her two brothers back to the village. LILY supports the GNK school in the Bharatpur district and Manju was educated there. Later, Indramani was rescued from the brothel by her daughters.

Manju became an active member of the Self Help Group run by our partner organisation. That helped her to set up her husband in business by taking a bank loan to purchase a second-hand auto rickshaw. When the debt was repaid, she took a second loan to set up shop in the village, selling cosmetics and artificial jewellery. Manju has also built her own two-room house in the village. She could achieve all this only with our support.
